Snohomish Regional Fire & Rescue launches community survey

[Monroe, WA] – Snohomish Regional Fire & Rescue has launched a Community Survey and are inviting their residents to make their voices heard. They are a growing fire and emergency services district that now serves over 175,000 residents. The fire district is committed to engaging the community in order to serve them better and incorporate their needs into future planning efforts. They are wanting to gain input on the following:

- satisfaction with fire services from Snohomish Regional Fire & Rescue
- how to pay for fire services
- what residents think of alternative tools to property tax funding
- the urgency of capital facilities priorities

Residents living within Snohomish Regional Fire & Rescue's jurisdiction can complete the survey online. If residents choose not complete the online survey, they may receive a phone call from the research provider. If someone completes the survey online they will be taken off of the phone list. The fire district hopes for strong participation from all communities they serve including Lake Stevens, Monroe, and unincorporated neighborhoods in Snohomish County.

The survey should take approximately 10 minutes and all answers are confidential. Only the 3rd party research provider will see resident's individual responses. The survey will be open from May 4, 2021 through May 16, 2021.
