Significant Alarms

Water Rescue

Multiple units responded to a Water Rescue at the Bob Heirman Wildlife Park on Connelly Road in the West Battalion. The units arrived to find two fishermen stranded on an island in the river after water levels rose. They were unable to return to safety without assistance. BT 31 was launched to access the island, but prior to their arrival, another boater accessed the island and moved the fishermen to safety.

Fire Suppression / Special Operations

Trench Rescue Class

SRFR hosted an initial Trench Rescue Class for the Snohomish County Technical Rescue Team from October 2-6 at Station 82 and the proposed Station 84 site. This initial course is a requirement to be a member of the County Trench Rescue Team. Thank you to Battalion Chief Kosiba for helping coordinate this class.

Emergency Medical Services

IGel Training

Over the past month, the MSO group has trained 51 members between SRFR and Snohomish County Fire District 4 in IGel placement. This is part of an ongoing effort to get all SRFR members state-certified in this skill. A big thanks to Battalion Chief Putnam for his help in getting these individuals state-certified!

The MSO group attended a two-day EMS Leadership Workshop put on by Fitch and Associates. Topics included Just Culture, QI Processes, and Customer Service.

Hazmat

Marysville Fire District hosted a county hazmat technician-level course and nine SRFR members participated. The District thanks these nine members for taking the opportunity to learn this specialty.

Vehicle Fires

Braven Metals in Lake Stevens gave SRFR the opportunity to train with a new foam that works well on electric vehicle fires. The Training Division invited surrounding agencies to join the training so they could also evaluate the capability of the foam on electric vehicle fires. Braven has been extremely accommodating with our training needs and we are so appreciative of our relationship with them.

COMEX Workshop

From October 11 through 13 the Commissioners, Union Leadership, and Executive Staff participated in an intensive workshop where the team reviewed the Strategic Plan, 2023 accomplishments, and preliminary discussion of the 2024 Budget. The workshop also included a presentation about the current economic conditions presented by two professors from Western Washington University.

November Fire Levy Lid Lift Election

SRFR members have been working with the public to inform them about Proposition One. Voters will be considering approval of a Fire Levy lid lift of \$0.36 per \$1,000 during the November 7, 2023, general election. The lid lift would return the rate to \$1.50.

The \$0.36 lid lift supports the following:

- Fill open positions for emergency personnel to improve service reliability across the District.
- Rebuild Station 81 in Lake Stevens, relocate and rebuild Station 32 in Monroe, and remodel the vehicle repair shop in Monroe.
- Replace lost funding due to changes in how the federal government reimburses fire Districts for the transport of Medicaid patients.
