OPERATIONS

<u>Significant Alarms</u> Motor Vehicle Collision

On the morning of April 16, Snohomish Regional Fire & Rescue (SRFR), with mutual aid from Snohomish County Fire District 5 (SCFD5), responded to a motor vehicle collision involving a car and a semi-truck on SR 2, just east of Monroe.

Battalion 31 arrived to find a heavily damaged vehicle with the driver trapped. East Battalion and SCFD 5 crews quickly began extrication and had the driver out within 10 minutes. Medical Services Officer 71 arrived shortly after and assisted with medical care. Despite this swift extrication and support from paramedics, the driver was found to be in fatal cardiac arrest. The occupants of the semi-truck and another vehicle declined medical care. SRFR appreciates the coordinated efforts and professionalism of all involved.

Motor Vehicle Collision

On April 19, East Battalion units responded to a serious three-vehicle collision involving a trapped driver. The crash occurred at high speed, sending one vehicle off the roadway and into nearby trees. Law enforcement was already on scene when SRFR responders arrived.



Three patients were quickly triaged, with one requiring a complex extrication due to significant vehicle damage. SRFR established a traffic safety zone, provided medical care, and worked quickly to free the trapped individual, who was subsequently transported for further medical care. The other two individuals involved did not require medical transport.

Mutual Aid Fire with Injuries

SRFR's North Battalion units responded with Granite Falls Fire District 17 to a residential fire that resulted in three injuries. One individual sustained burns while attempting to control the fire using a pressure washer. Medic 82 transported one patient with airway injuries from heat and smoke exposure. The remaining patients were treated on scene.

Special Operations

Technical Rescue Response

On April 24, SRFR provided mutual aid to Sky Valley Fire for the rescue of a climber who was injured after a fall on the Index Wall. Paramedics and technical rescue personnel joined the operation, working with other rescue teams in challenging terrain. The patient was assessed, stabilized, secured in a Stokes basket, safely lowered to the ground, and transported by Sky Valley Fire for further medical care.

Technical Rescue Response

On April 26, members of SRFR's Technical Rescue Team responded to the Index Wall after a climber fell approximately 100 feet. The individual was conscious with back and leg injuries.

SRFR's Engine 82 and Technical Rescue 31 partnered with Snohomish County Fire District 4 and Snohomish County Search & Rescue in a complex, multi-agency operation. Crews hiked into the remote location, established an extrication plan, and coordinated with Snohawk 10 for airlift. The individual was safely transferred to the Snohawk 10 flight crew for transport and continued medical care. Read more about the rescue here.

Logistics

Stations 32 and 81

SRFR and our project management firm, OAC, continue to meet with BN Builders/Miller Hull to discuss program planning and cost estimates as we move toward establishing a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP). The project is currently at approximately 30% design, with the next milestone being 100% design completion. Based on current site layouts, Station 81 is planned as a two-story structure, and Station 32 will be a single-story facility.

SRFR is meeting with the City of Lake Stevens to coordinate details regarding the shared stormwater vault and finalizing project scheduling. An amendment to the existing Interlocal Agreement (ILA) will be necessary due to Land Pro Group's withdrawal from the project.

Additionally, collaboration with the City of Monroe on Station 32 continues, specifically regarding right-of-way requests.

SRFR has received a Letter of Conditions from Alderwood Water & Wastewater District (AWWD) following their review of our plans and Developer Extension application. We are in the process of responding to their feedback.
