Snohomish County Fire District 7 to become Snohomish Regional Fire and Rescue

Beginning January 1, 2021, Snohomish County Fire District 7 will be renamed Snohomish Regional Fire and Rescue.

Monroe, Wash. – During the 2019 August Primary Election, voters in Lake Stevens approved the merger with Snohomish County Fire District 7 by almost 80 percent. The two fire districts officially merged January 1, 2020.

From the beginning of merger discussions, the idea of renaming the fire district to better represent the communities served by the newly merged districts has been at the forefront of many meetings. Bonding to the Snohomish County area and highlighting regional partnerships has been a long standing value of both districts.

Following a series of internal and external surveys, Fire District 7's Board of Fire Commissioners approved the district to be renamed Snohomish Regional Fire and Rescue at their June 11, 2020 board meeting. While fire districts are separate from County government, the name change required approval from the Snohomish County Council. The County Council approved the name change at their meeting on June 22, 2020.

The merger between the districts has resulted in improved service. Most notably in firefighter training, efficiencies in administrative services, and importantly, an increase in the fire district's ability to respond to large-scale emergencies like COVID-19.
