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FAQ: FIRE LEVY LID LIFT

WHAT IS ON MY BALLOT? We are asking voters to consider a single-year fire levy lid lift on the November 7, 2023, general election ballot. This would return the fire levy rate to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value, which was previously approved by voters in 2021.

HOW DO WE FUND FIRE AND EMS? We fund daily operations through fire and EMS levies. The fire levy is capped at \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value and the EMS levy is capped at \$0.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

HOW WILL FIRE LEVY LID LIFT FUNDS BE USED?

- To fill open positions for emergency and support services personnel to continue to provide a fast and reliable emergency response.
- To help fund rebuilding Station 81 in downtown Lake Stevens, relocating Station 32 in Monroe for a faster response, and expanding Station 31 to repair emergency apparatus.
- To replace lost funding from changes in how the federal government reimburses fire districts for medical care and transport of Medicaid patients.

WHY IS MY FIRE DISTRICT ASKING FOR THIS? We have identified improvements needed to maintain the quality and level of emergency services residents require. However, revenue is not keeping up with the cost to provide service.

WHY DID THE FIRE LEVY RATE DROP? Levy rates fall as property values rise to limit a fire district to roughly the same amount of revenue per year plus a 1% increase. For example, voters approved a fire levy of \$1.50 per \$1,000 in 2021. The fire levy has fallen to \$1.14 per \$1,000 since that time.

WHAT WILL THIS COST? Property owners would pay an additional \$36 per year (\$3 per month) for every \$100,000 of their assessed value.

WHAT ELSE SHOULD I KNOW?

- The assessed value of your property is often lower than its market value.
- Our revenue does not increase by the same rate as property values.
 For example, if the assessed value of your property changes, we are still limited to a 1% revenue increase per year.
- Any tax exemptions you have with Snohomish County will still apply.
 If you need assistance, Snohomish County offers a Senior Citizen and People with Disabilities property tax exemption program.
